Beyond UHN's exemplary response to the pandemic, there are many accomplishments from the past year worth noting.

- Recognized as one of the top five hospitals in the world by Newsweek.
- Named Canada's top research hospital for the ninth consecutive year.
- Continued our leadership role in developing new models of care by expanding into integrated care, which reaches the home and our wider community.
- Named one of Canada's top 20 best places to work by Glassdoor.

- Generated \$37 million in licensing revenue during the fiscal year - breaking our commercialization record at UHN.
- Launched The Institute for Education Research at UHN, a first-in-class institute focused on improving the quality of education and overall competency of learners, while helping to ensure providers across all disciplines are well-poised to respond to emerging technologies and medical breakthroughs.
- Achieved many world firsts, including the first robotic-assisted neurovascular intervention and the first use of holographic imaging technology during the repair of a heart valve.

UHN also significantly advanced our Population Health and Social Medicine initiative by signing a Memorandum of Understanding with the City of Toronto and United Way - the first agreement of its kind in Canada. Additionally, throughout the pandemic, we have been partnering with communities to support under-housed and homeless populations through the creation of alternative housing sites.

As we move forward, we know we will face unique challenges. We also know we will continue to seize any and all opportunities to advance science and patient care. We are already seeing some silver linings, including the opportunity to dramatically advance our commitment to expanding digital health and applying technologies that really matter to patients. As an example, we now have more than 2,500 members of TeamUHN - including physicians, nurses, allied health, and administrative professionals - on our digital health platform. These team members have been serving more than 6,500 patients per week using digital health interventions during the pandemic.

We would also be remiss if we didn't express special thanks to our nursing colleagues. The World Health Organization named 2020 the Year of the Nurse (and Midwife). They truly are the backbone of our health system.

It is during challenging times such as this that we see the best in humanity. That has certainly been the case at UHN, and we remain steadfast in our commitment to building A Healthier World.

(in thousands)




Revenue
