# Assistive Devices Program for Mobility Aids



Assistive Devices Program (ADP) is a government funding program. It pays up to 75% of some mobility devices. For more about this program, visit: <u>www.health.gov.on.ca/adp</u>. To qualify for the program you must meet the following criteria:

- Valid Ontario Health Card.
- Have a physical disability.

#### **Funded Equipment**

The program helps pay for mobility equipment you use daily. You must need the equipment for at least 6 months. If you need a power wheelchair with positioning (tilt, recline, or elevating leg rests), you must use the Centralized Equipment Pool. This is a recycling program run by Motion.

There are specific criteria for each type of device. Your therapist will know what you qualify for. Funded equipment include:

- Wheelchairs
- Cushions and back supports
- Walking aids (canes and walkers)

ADP does not offer funding for used equipment, repairs, or maintenance. Funding is not provided for devices, used solely for:

- Traveling to and from destinations in the community
- Post-operative needs or pain management
- Training, exercise, or therapeutic purposes
- Work, school, recreation, or social activities
- Feeding, sleeping, and other non-mobility related activities

**Note:** If you are still deciding on a wheelchair or seating at the time of discharge you may need to rent equipment. This will be arranged between you and your vendor.

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### Applying for a Mobility Device

- 1. Choose a vendor.
- 2. Have an ADP authorized OT or PT complete an initial seating and mobility assessment to determine what your needs are.
- 3. When possible, try the equipment and decide what works for you.
- 4. Get a written quote from the vendor.
- 5. Provide payment. You pay the 'client portion' (about 25%. It might be more if you are buying items not listed with ADP). Your therapist will complete an application for the government funded portion (up to 75%). It may take over 1 month to approve funding for the equipment.
- Wait for delivery. Wheelchairs may take 2 months or more to be built and shipped.
  It can take 2 weeks or more for walking aids to be shipped.
- 7. Once you receive your new device, you might need to return see a therapist to get fitted for it. Your inpatient therapist can link you with the right service.

### **Changing Your Device in the Future**

The program will only give funding if you are unable to use your current device. This could be because of a change in your function, body size or if the device is broken beyond repair. The program has specific funding periods for the different devices:

- Wheelchairs and Walking aids = 5 years.
- Power dynamic positioning devices (tilt, elevating leg rests, recline) = 5 years.
- Cushions, back supports and other positioning devices = 2 years.
